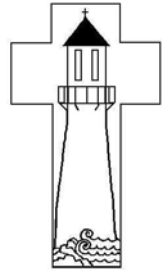

First, I need to tell you that I could not attend the CWG although registered because I had an emergency eye "operation" at the last minute. So the information here is what I have compiled from various sources. I am receiving documents everyday. There's too much to summarize so I will have packets of information available at the PW Synod Gathering in Stony Point in November. The former PWE Committee will be meeting in September to begin working on training materials. And, by the time you receive this Newsletter you will be able to go to the CWG web site www.pcusa.org/pw/gathering and, according to the Horizons article, get the results of the voting on the various issues that were considered at the Business Meeting. If your Presbytery cannot send a rep to the November Gathering, please contact me and I will send it to you. One important item to be addressed is we are not to use the word Enabler or PW Enabler and second, that this is a fluid program to be implemented during the 2006-2009 Triennium which can be tailored to each presbytery's needs.

One of the new programs is better communication. To that end, please be sure to send me your new leaders contact information if you changed in June or are changing in September. Also continue to send me your newsletter and directories.

Please remember the **WOMEN'S BIOGRAPHY PROJECT** of the Presbyterian Historical Society. They will archive women's stories of their journeys toward church leadership and ordination. In closing, we had a great workshop at Stony Point in April. About 25 of us gathered for training, sharing, learning and receiving resources. 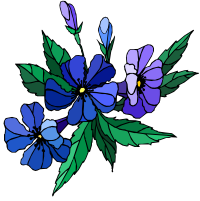

PW Justice and Peace Issues

Greetings from Frontera de Cristo, one of the seven binational border ministries of the National Presbyterian Church of Mexico and the Presbyterian Church USA. The Frontera de

Cristo is located in Douglas Arizona and serves the people of Douglas and Agua Prieta, Sonora Mexico. Three members of my Church (University Presbyterian, Buffalo, NY) and I had the wonderful opportunity to visit this mission for about five days in June. We saw an amazing group of Christians on both sides of the border working to make life better for all of their people. The motto of the mission is "Share the Good News in Word and Deed." They carry this motto out well. The mission is led by a very young and very personable minister, Mark Adams. Two of the programs we visited were "Just Coffee" and "Agua Para La Vida," (Water for life).

"Just Coffee" is a coffee cooperative dedicated to addressing the immigration crisis by providing coffee farmers a fair price for their crops. The coffee is grown in lush green land just right for growing coffee in the southern most state of Mexico, Chiapas. "Just Coffee" does not use any intermediaries. The coffee is sent directly from the Chiapas farms to Agua Prieta where it is roasted, ground and packaged, and then shipped to the final consumers (for instance, our church members at University Presbyterian). The "Just Coffee" co-operative pays the coffee farmers \$1.30 per lb, whereas some major coffee companies only pay \$.25 per lb. In addition, the co-operative is able to provide healthcare to its members and their families. We had the opportunity to visit the roasting plant in Agua Prieta. Here we saw how the coffee was roasted in their new roasting machine and how it is packaged for final sale. A caption I read under a picture in the mission's newsletter sums up this part of our visit. It read "Drying coffee beans in Chiapas, instead of landscaping grass in the US. "Just Coffee" statistics: \$65,000 reinvested

in the business; over 100 tons roasted; 37 families with no need to migrate.

The second program we visited was Agua Para L Vida, which delivers water to 21 tanks located in the desert on the Mexican side of the border. Men, women and children who are trying to cross into the US through the desert may drink from these tanks. Providing this water is not an attempt to encourage illegal immigration, but an attempt to prevent more deaths in the desert. I, personally, do not know how I stand on the migration policies in the US but, I do know I would not like to see or hear of anyone dying of dehydration trying to cross the desert. To give us a feel for what it is like we hiked about two miles through the desert to the border. We were well equipped with plenty of water, proper clothing, and footwear to make this small journey. We found it hot and sometimes not very comfortable. Imagine adults and children walking ten to a 100 times farther than we did without proper water and gear and with the added stress of trying to make it across the border where there may be hope for a better way of life. In 2005, Agua Para La Vida distributed 70,000 gallons of water to these 21 tanks.

We also had a chance to worship with Mexican Presbyterians, talk with migrants that were sent back to Mexico, and see the beginnings of a store front mission that will be open to migrants who are brought there by the Border Patrol after they have been picked up for trying to reach the US, or are being sent back after making it into the US.

To me, it was a very interesting mission trip to see and hear first hand some of the causes of our Mexican immigration problems.

I am the treasurer to the woman's guild fellowship in our presbytery and Rose is the chairperson. We feel very honored to be part of this conference and believe it is God's plan that women, regardless of race or status gather to have fellowship, share their different experiences and encourage one

another, with the goal of building god's kingdom. We bring you love and greetings from the church in Kenya, especially the woman's guild movement from Ibiriga and Mutembe local churches.

We bless the Lord for the ladies from the Hudson River Presbytery of U.S.A. We are overwhelmed by your love and hospitality expressed to us through your invitation, provision of our tickets and our upkeep during this conference. We also appreciate our sister Rev. Marion who has worked tirelessly to make this trip a success.

.... We are all bestowed with different gifts and talents and God did this with the intention that different abilities will compliment each other to enable us to be the light of the world. I therefore encourage you ladies to be willing to stand up and be counted as this is what the Lord expects of us. If we fail in this, we fail in response to God's call. May the Lord's favor be upon you as you purpose to be the light in your families and the world at large. Thank you!"

**Brazilian Snapshot: Casa da Menina Mae
(Home of the Girl Mother)
Roberta Mansfield,
Global Exchange Participant**

As we were admitted, the woman at the door looked up and down the street, to make sure we hadn't been followed. We had traveled by

subway, and then on foot, a group of six, including Arch Woodruff (our guide and translator), the husband of Linnis Cook, our host in Sao Paulo. The reason for the caution was that the adolescent girls in the home had been victims of domestic violence. The location of the home was not public knowledge, for the protection of the girls and their babies.

Yes, pregnancy in adolescence is a problem in Brazil, but, similarly to the shift in attitudes in the United States, the stigma has faded. These girls are not hiding from society and those who really love them. But they do need protection from those who would do them harm. The girls we saw reminded me (in age, size and maturity) of the youth of any church. Most of them have family in Sao Paulo, although they could come from anywhere in Brazil. They attend school either in the morning or the afternoon (which is all the schooling anyone gets in public school in Brazil).

While they attend school, staff persons at the home take care of the babies.

We sat around the kitchen table for tea. One girl had made a delicious cake for our visit. They asked us questions about the United States. They wanted to know if we were afraid to fly. (One can assume none of them had ever flown.) One girl asked if we were going to take them to America. I said I didn't know. (To say "no" outright seemed too cruel.) They watch a soap opera called "America," which makes the United States seem like an idyllic paradise. I told them that the United States isn't perfect either.

The girls can come to the home at any point in their pregnancies, and may stay until their babies are nine months old. There were several babies present, as lovable as babies always are. One girl pulled me aside as the group went on a tour of the home. She led me to her room to show me her sleeping son in his crib. He was beautiful, of course. I was glad I had learned the word "bonito" (handsome or beautiful). It's amazing how much can be communicated without words, also. Her love for him was palpable. I wondered about his future, and hers. I often think of them and all the disadvantaged people I met while I was in Brazil. I pray that God will inspire us to help them.



Together in Service

A New PW Mission Program

I attended two mission workshops at Louisville; both were very informative and a big help in looking ahead to the new PW program, formerly called Mission Opportunities.

Much remains the same in the mission program, but there are some definite changes. No longer are specific agencies assigned to presbyteries for PWs in the congregation to choose from – each PW is encouraged to study its area and choose to help where they see need. If you still wish to support agencies at a distance, that's fine, but please call them to be sure exactly what their current needs are. Presbytery PW coordinators have a list of all agencies previously supported around the Synod, with contact names, phone numbers and addresses.

There are changes in the overseas needs because shipping costs are high for us here, and it may also prove very expensive for the recipients to receive, store, and distribute what we send. The main items that are still needed (to be sent) are sheets (all kinds, new or barely used), twin or double thermal blankets, baby blankets (about 36 x 45), baby caps, and baby gowns. Money is needed for items that can now best be purchased on site such as mosquito nets, bicycles (used by health workers in Africa to visit homes), mattresses, and nurses' uniforms (required in Haiti for young women to participate in nursing programs).

The address for monetary contributions – you can specify what it is for – is PC(USA), PW Remittance Processing, PO Box 643652, Pittsburg, PA 15264-3652. The address for items sent is Presbyterian Church (USA), c/o Brethren Service Center, Box 188, Route 31-500 Main, New Windsor MD 21776. Please always include a note saying that it is part of your PW mission giving, and give a name and address for a contact person. If you send a check, write **“Together in Service”** on the memo line of your check.

There will be a mission workshop at the Synod Gathering at Stony Point in November, also

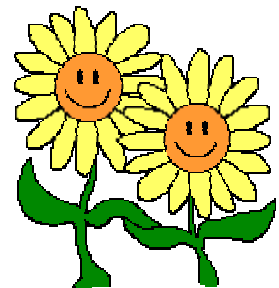

Dear Presbyterian Women:

I want to thank you all and the PWSNE Coordinating Team for inviting me to be the Seminarian Intern for PWSNE for the past year. What a surprise it was last summer when Moderator Anne Reynolds called to ask me if I would like this wonderful opportunity to observe PWSNE in its Coordinating Team meeting in July 2005 at Stony Point, New York, again at the Synod Gathering in November 2005 in Albany, New York, and then to attend the Churchwide Gathering in Louisville, Kentucky this July.

The PWSNE Coordinating Team warmly received me at its planning meeting at Stony Point as it installed new officers and prepared for programs for the coming years. The same was true again in November when a larger group of women gathered in Albany to learn about grant writing and issues facing local PWs.

The finale was attending the Churchwide Gathering in Louisville in July – a first for me! I was honored when Anne asked if I would offer the blessing at the PWSNE luncheon at which over 200 of the Synod women were present. During the five days I met women from across the country and from nations beyond our shores. I was astonished while talking to a woman sitting behind me before the plenary on Friday night to learn that she and my brother are members of the same church in Champaign, Illinois, and on Saturday to have dinner with another woman who knew my cousin in Nashville, Tennessee. I learned much from each of the workshops I attended – new insights gained into grief and loss; the enthusiasm expressed by Christian Educators through art; and a disturbing realization of practices in the health insurance industry. It was moving to hear from our ecumenical sisters who spoke at the business meeting, as they shared greetings from their own women's organizations. The plenary sessions, held each morning and evening, provided inspiring speakers and song for all who were in attendance.

The culmination at each of these three gatherings, at Stony Point, in Albany and at Louisville, was the worship of God – prayer expressing gratitude and bringing discernment, song expressing hope and joy, and the celebration of Communion. As we were gathered in Christ's name before the Lord's Table, all differences – age, race, nationality, marital or economic status – were set aside; we simply came before God as one of God's very own, united with each other through Jesus. What marvelous moments!

Again, I thank each of you for this opportunity to observe the dynamics of group process, but more importantly to be part of a terrific group of women, learning, sharing and worshiping in God's gracious Creation.
